Nine years ago Ken Duffin became our Featured Artist in October, the month he turned 87. When he came to Wenatchee Ken had retired from Boeing to move closer to his son Bret. During WWII he was in the Army Air Corps, says he painted a few young ladies on various bombers while working as an plane electrician. After the war Ken studied at the Chouinard Art Institute and Art Center College of Design in Los Angelos.

He became a freelance illustrator and a founding member and past president of the San Francisco Society of Illustrators. Ken moved to the Pacific Northwest and became a successful architectural illustrator and took

to painting in oils and watercolors. He was a lifelong member and past president of the Puget Sound Group of Northwest Painters and signature member of the Northwest Watercolor Society.

Ken's paintings have been accepted and sold in many juried shows including the National Arts for the Parks and National Oil Painters of America. While working at Boeing he was chosen to paint the first 747 in Flight.

When Ken moved to Wenatchee he painted with the Tuesday Group of water media painters and the Wenatchee Watercolor Society before becoming an active member of Two Rivers Art Gallery. During his time in Wenatchee he gave us many opportunities to see him at work creating paintings and participating in our plein air activities and art shows at the gallery.

We just learned of Ken's death after an internet search. He died shortly after moving to Missouri in 2020. Ken Duffin was an artist's artist and will be missed and long remembered.

Jerry Kinney, long time member and generous benefactor of Two Rivers Gallery has passed. His travels took him to Russia where he studied the great master painters. The gallery has two of his paintings on sale. He gave most of his works to the Cashmere Museum before retiring to Avamere Senior Living. OIL AND RETIREMENT DO MIX FOR LANDSCAPE PAINTER

wish I'd started about 30 or 40 years earlier — I'd probably be able to draw better." Jerry Kinney, 84 this year and a prolific and primarily self-taught landscape painter, says that's his only regret.

"But with the painting... I've studied hundreds of art books, gone to dozens of museums. In a college class, your professor can critique your painting. But I guess I've just critiqued my own over the years." He's also had notably fine mentors: local artists Bill Reese and Walter Graham, (each now deceased) as well as Rod Weagant, have inspired and encouraged him

Oil painting was not a first love. Jerry tried it as a teenager after his mother: gave him a "pochade," a lightweight, fold-up painting box meant for plein air artists. But painting on canvas was of little interest to him.

Instead, starting at age 17 his creative outlet until recently was designing, and building to scale, miniscule realistic environments — railroad villages, for which he has received two national awards.

After Jerry's childhood in Cashmere, the family moved frequently. "That was hard on my schooling," he recalled. Shortly after high school he joined the Army, saw action in Korea and upon his discharge returned to the Wenatchee area. There he stepped into a job that grew and changed and which he en-

joyed for decades at the Tree Fruit Research Center.

"I've had a good life, a really good life," Jerry declared as he related some high points. Both of his careers have been long and satisfying: his daily job to support the family (33 years) and then his oil painting (24 years and counting).

Jerry and his wife Barbara used his postretirement years well. After 1982 they traveled extensively overseas, but one trip to New England in 1990 dramatically changed his life. They visited several art galleries. He can't recall why exactly, but some of the particular paintings made him say, "I think I'd like to do this again." As he describes it,

rural childhood offered many opportunities to develop my creative nature. I am the youngest grandchild of early pioneer author, U. E. Fries, From Copenhagen to Okanogan and his wife, Anna Catherine, who homesteaded at Green Valley Farm in Okanogan's North Star area, Washington Territory. They valued the arts as a standard of success. My father was raised in Wenatchee and became an orchardist. When I wasn't practicing my flute or riding a horse, my parents patiently encouraged me to use any artistic mediums I could find around the property. My mechanical genius father supplied tools, even if I occasionally blew a fuse. Poor eyesight challenged me; trial and error were my first instructors. I carved the fruit woods we pruned in the winter, painted and drew on freezer paper, learned sewing skills through 4-H, hitched horse gear from baling twine, and constructed "found object" sculptures from my dad's collection. I was a horse crazy youngster. Our milk cow, Diamond, was my first "horse."

As my childhood farm life of responsibilities, 4-H, Camp Fire Girls and joy of discovering ways to create art matured with me, I focused on music but fine arts remained my passion. Through the generosity of my paternal aunt, I earned my teaching degree from W. S. U. I taught fine arts sourcing Disciplined Based Art Education standards in Republic, Bridgeport, Selah, and Pateros School Districts until I retired.

It is a rare advantage that my teaching profession also is my business and hobby. I tend to capture details of nature's subjects that inspire me when I walk

around the neighborhood. I create mostly with watercolor but also use multiple art mediums including printmaking, cast paper, basketry, drawing and calligraphy. Look for my inherited registered livestock brand with my signature on each of my art works.



































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
